Sermon Summary: Two Kinds of Wisdom (James 3:13-18)

James contrasts two types of wisdom: **earthly wisdom**, which is driven by jealousy and selfish ambition, and **wisdom from above**, which is pure, peace-loving, and sincere. He emphasizes that wisdom is not just about what we say but how we live. True wisdom is displayed in honorable conduct and humility.

The passage warns against the destructive nature of earthly wisdom, which leads to disorder and evil, and urges believers to embrace godly wisdom, which produces peace and righteousness. James calls for a reevaluation of how we define wisdom, emphasizing that it is not about intelligence or eloquence but about a life that reflects God's ways.

The sermon explores the implications of these two wisdoms, particularly in the modern context, highlighting how social media fosters jealousy, boasting, and dishonesty. It challenges believers to examine their hearts, repent from worldly wisdom, and pursue a life marked by godly wisdom—characterized by humility, integrity, and peace.

Two Kinds of Wisdom

Selfish ambition	Peace-loving
Boasting and lying to cover the truth	Gentle at all times

Earthly, unspiritual, and demonic	Willing to yield to others
Leads to disorder and evil	Full of mercy and good deeds
Rooted in pride and self-promotion	Shows no favoritism, always sincere
Destroys relationships and trust	Produces righteousness and peace

Main Points & Questions

1. Wisdom is Proven by Actions, Not Just Words (James 3:13)

- True wisdom is demonstrated by an honorable life and humility.
- Wisdom is not about intellectual ability or deep insights but about how we conduct ourselves.
- **Reflection Questions:**
 - How do your actions reflect godly wisdom?
 - In what ways might you be relying on words instead of deeds to show wisdom?

2. Earthly Wisdom Leads to Destruction (James 3:14-16)

- Jealousy and selfish ambition are signs of earthly wisdom, which is unspiritual and even demonic.
- This kind of wisdom fosters disorder and every kind of evil.
- Social media often cultivates this destructive wisdom, promoting comparison, boasting, and dishonesty.
- **Reflection Questions:**
 - Where do you see jealousy and selfish ambition at work in your life?

- How has social media influenced the way you perceive success and wisdom?

3. Godly Wisdom is Pure and Peaceful (James 3:17-18)

- The wisdom from above is pure, peace-loving, gentle, merciful, and sincere.
- Peacemakers who pursue this wisdom reap a harvest of righteousness.
- This wisdom is a stark contrast to the world's wisdom, requiring faith and humility to live it out.
- **Reflection Questions:**
 - How can you pursue peace in your relationships this week?
 - Are there areas in your life where you need to yield rather than insist on being right?

4. The Root of True Wisdom is Jesus (1 Corinthians 1:24)

- Jesus is the ultimate example of godly wisdom.
- Walking in wisdom means living in the fear of the Lord and trusting His ways.
- Repentance and surrender are necessary to continually align with God's wisdom.
- **Reflection Questions:**
 - Where in your life are you still relying on earthly wisdom instead of godly wisdom?
 - How can you seek and apply the wisdom of Jesus in your daily decisions?

Final Call to Action

- Examine whether your wisdom aligns with God's wisdom or the world's.
- Confess and repent where necessary, embracing the humility that comes from wisdom.
- Ask God for wisdom, as He promises to give it generously (James 1:5).
- Be intentional about fostering peace and sincerity in your relationships.
